



A time to reflect....

Here's hoping.... People, believers and unbelievers say it. When it is said, it usually refers to something specific that we would like to happen or would not like to happen. 'Here's hoping' implies uncertainty; not knowing. It implies that whatever it is we are hoping for is out of our hands. That may be considered as negative, as it leaves room

for fear of the possibility that the opposite of what is hoped for, will happen.

However, if you believe in the creative power of God, then you know that so much more is possible than the limited possibilities we have in mind. When we say with David:

Preserve me, O God, for in you I take refuge.

² I say to the Lord, "You are my Lord;
I have no good apart from you." (Psalm 16:1)

there is more possible than what we can think of.

As the students of this Rabbi learn:

The Rabbi asks his pupils: 'How can we identify the moment of dawn; the moment when the night ends and the day begins...?'

One of the students answers: 'When we, from a distance, can distinguish between a sheep and a dog'. The Rabbi says, 'No.'

'When we can distinguish between a fig tree and a vine'...another student says 'No', the Rabbi says.

'Please tell us the answer', the students say.

The Rabbi says: 'Dawn has arrived when there is sufficient light to look people in the eye and to recognise them as brothers and sisters. Until then, darkness is still with us.'

What this wise teacher has in mind goes above and beyond the thoughts of his students.

What he teaches his students is said in Proverbs,

The teaching of the wise is a fountain of life. (13:14)

while in Psalm 16, David praises the Holy One, for making known to him the path of life,

You make known to me the path of life (Psalm 16:11)

If God is for us what He was for David, then we let God take us beyond our thinking, into the Hope He has given us, which is the opposite of false hope. The Hope God has given us lies solidly in His Son, whom He let go from the light in His heavenly home into His dark world.

It is this breathtaking initiative of God that we reflect on at this time of Advent while moving towards Christmas.

For so many, this time is a painful time, when loss, loneliness, grief is felt more intensely than ever. May God, in His own mysterious ways, make His presence known to them and so give them comfort. May His light shine through us so that we, by reflecting His light, may be channels of His Peace on the path of our lives: the path which He has made known to us through Christ, so that we may recognise each other as children of the One Father.

On that visit I was able to see so much of the wonderful work carried out by our partners, the Church of Central Africa (CCAP), throughout the country. One thing which stood out for me was the hunger for education at all levels. The Church has a range of educational institutions and are providing such valuable learning for their students. This has made me keen to support one small part of this ambition to help build the people of God in Malawi.

I am commending to you the resource above, which you can find out more about on the Church of Scotland website: https://churchofscotland.org.uk/news-and-events/news/articles/moderators-challenge-to-light-up-learning-in-malawi - it gives you the opportunity to join me in supporting the provision of solar power, through light libraries in CCAP Primary Schools and solar panels for the new PhD centre at Zomba Theological University.

My challenge to you is to help me to provide that much needed light to allow study in the hours of darkness in Malawi. I wonder how many light libraries we can achieve? A solar light costs just £10.

As well as direct transfer and cheques for any donations we have a donate button on the webpage: https://www.churchofscotland.org.uk/connect/moderators-challenge and also a QR code on the resource. This has all gone live today, and will continue accepting donations until the beginning of May 2025. So although this might fit well during Advent, there will still be an opportunity for you to participate throughout the first part of 2025. The Church of Scotland website will also have a downloadable PowerPoint presentation, poster and some art work within the next week.

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FINANCE UPDATE November 2024

This note covers September and October 2024.

As usual, donations from members and friends of the church, along with Gift Aid on these offerings, made up the single most significant portion of the congregation's income. Thank you, as always, for your ongoing support.

We received donations from the Snowdrop Café and ACTs (After Church Coffees and Teas) as well as hall let payments from other groups which use the church hall. Sales of Sandra's jam also contributed to our income.

You may be aware that the Kirk Session arranged for high-level cleaning to take place in the main church hall. The cost of this exercise will be met from our "Restricted Fabric Fund".

The annual "MacMillan coffee morning" took place in September and raised a total of £1,241.60. This has been passed on to MacMillan Cancer Support, who aim to help people with cancer live life as fully as they can, by providing physical, financial and emotional support.

The congregation also supported St. Margaret's House in Polmont again, by donating the retiring offering from our October communion service. This raised a total of £196.39 which has been sent to CrossReach for allocation to St. Margaret's House.

Finally, the Kirk Session received a request for financial help from St. Margaret's Primary School. The school is aiming to take classes to a pantomime this year, and they were hoping we could help them include children from families who may not be able to meet the full cost of the outing. The Kirk Session agreed to support this, in the hope that letting these children take part in the trip along with their classmates will help them not to feel "left out". £300 from church funds was given to the school to help with this.

We hope you all have a joyful and peaceful Christmas season and wish you a happy and healthy New Year!

In <u>November 2008</u>, we had asked some members of the congregation about what Christmas meant to them. And I found that I had written this!!!



I have always looked forward to the Watchnight Carol Services, regardless of where I have been worshipping - they always seem to hold that special air of magic and expectation.

And here in Polmont Old, when I look out from my position at the organ and see the church full of people holding their flickering candles at midnight, it is such a beautiful sight and I sense a feeling of community joy and happiness.

As a child in the early 50s, possibly just after the end of rationing, I recall the excitement of going to the

local railway station in Dumfries to collect the Christmas box from my grandparents' farm in the north.
We normally only collected a small box of a dozen eggs on a regular basis,

but at Christmas time this box was much bigger and contained the Christmas dinner in it too - the hen, which my grandmother had killed and plucked from among her flock of many hundreds. This was in the days when chicken was a treat for special occasions, and not as commonplace as it is today!
